DUT COVID-19 RESPONSE TASK TEAM WEEKLY UPDATE

Dear staff and students

It is almost six months since South Africa launched its COVID-19 vaccination programme. In our country, to date, more than 23.4 million people have received at least one dose of the vaccine and 13 million people (22%) are now fully vaccinated. Experts say that while our vaccination coverage is increasing, this is happening at a slow rate. Worldwide, 7.36 billion doses of the vaccine have been administered and 3.16 billion people are currently fully vaccinated.

From today until Sunday, 14 November 2021, South Africa's Department of Health is holding a *Vooma Vaccination* Weekend, where vaccination sites in both the public and private sectors will be open all weekend to vaccinate people against COVID-19. The vaccines will be administered free of charge.

The end-of-year holiday season is fast approaching and many of us are looking forward to a joyful, peaceful and memorable time with our loved ones. To help make sure that you have a safe holiday celebration, please ensure that you are fully vaccinated against COVID-19. Quick and easy-access vaccination is available at the DUT Isolempilo Clinic on the Steve Biko campus every Thursday from 08h30 to 15h00. You don't need an appointment. If you would prefer the *Pfizer* vaccine instead of the *Johnson & Johnson* vaccine being administered, please contact the Clinic to make an appointment. Remember, with the current temporary closure of the Durban campuses following the recent violent protests, please call the Clinic before attempting to visit. You can also take advantage of the Department of Health's Vooma Vaccination Weekend from today until Sunday by visiting one of these vaccination sites: https://sacoronavirus.co.za/active-vaccination-sites/. You can also go to Clicks, Dis-Chem or various other private facilities for safe, effective vaccination, whether you are on a private medical aid or not. When you're vaccinated, you can safely enjoy summer and mix socially over the holidays. Getting vaccinated is your key to safer social interaction, fun and celebrations this festive season. Students and staff from the Midlands campuses who are due for their second vaccine doses, will soon be informed of arrangements that are being made for vaccination.







A booster vaccination is now available for healthcare workers who participated in the Sisonke study and who received their first doses of the *Johnson & Johnson* vaccine. We will be in contact with those who are eligible for a booster vaccine.
